

2021 Valedictorian



NICC's 2021 Valedictorian, Selena Parker spoke at NICC's 2021 Graduation. Parker began her journey at NICC as a dual credit high school student who enrolled at NICC upon graduating. She shares her experiences here.

"Hello, my name is Selena Parker and I am Nebraska Indian Community College's (NICC) 2021 Valedictorian. My Umonhon name is Mi'-mi-te, which means Standing New Moon given to me by my grandparents. I am from the Umonhon Tribe and of the Thatada Clan.

When I began my journey for higher education I was faced with many challenges; first, with selecting the right institution that met my personal needs. I committed to NICC because of the affordability, location, and mission. My educational journey at NICC was a learning experience. I have gained plenty of knowledge both academically and socially. This has guided and prepared me to pursue a four-year degree at Wayne State College.

I will be pursuing a degree in elementary education. I chose education, because it has always been a dream of mine to work with the younger generation. I know how much an educator can impact a student's life. My goal is to give back to my community, and I believe I can do so by educating.

I have enjoyed my time at NICC and the experiences."

NICC'S 2021 Faculty of the Year







NICC was proud to honor 2021's Faculty of the Year at the 2021 Commencement Ceremony: The award, based on student vote, resulted in a tie this year, and both Wynema Morris (pictured far left) and the late, Joseph (Joe) Harlan (pictured middle) were honored at 2021's Graduation Commencement.

Wynema, adjunct faculty in the Native American Studies Department, who also serves on NICC's BOD, was the first to speak. In her speech, she expressed gratitude and thanks to share this award with her friend and colleague, Joe, who passed away in January of 2021. Wynema shared her congratulations to the students and the importance of their achievement. Wynema also spoke of Joe and their experiences teaching together and learning from one another, sharing the Umohon language and history. Wynema concluded her speech with the words, "We are still here" as well as her thanks for sharing this honor with her relative Joe.

Faculty of the Year, Joe Harlan taught Umonhon Language, as well as served as NICC's Umonhon Cultural Advisor. Dr. Kristine Sudbeck shared about his encouragement as an instructor and his kindness before inviting Joe's daughter, Sariah (pictured far right), to speak and accept the award on his behalf. She shared teachings from her father including his words, "Education is how you are going to help your people." Sariah shared about his love of learning, desire to always do his best, and also the importance for all to not take our blessings for granted. Sariah concluded speaking by sharing a prayer that her father spoke often in Umonhon. Sariah and her family accepted an NICC star quilt on Joe's behalf, and hugs were shared for her good words.

GWEN VARGAS PORTER

NICC's 2021 Graduation Keynote Speaker



Gwen Vargas-Porter (Umonhon), NICC's 2021 Graduation Keynote Speaker, is a person known by many titles- Umonhon Tribal Council Secretary, Social Worker, Mental Health Practitioner, Drug and Alcohol Counselor, Foster Parent, Mother, Nana, Umonhon Woman- just to name a few. Along with wearing many hats, Gwen also holds a handful of degrees including: Associates in Integrated Office Technologies from NICC (2003), Bachelors in Human and Social Services Administrative from Bellevue University (2005), Bachelors of Social Work, with an emphasis in Child Welfare from Briar Cliff University (2011), and Masters of Social Work from University of Iowa (2017). However, her path had not always been laid out so clearly.

Gwen started at NICC in 1999 as a non-traditional student who had worked hard to earn her GED. "It was empowering and inspiring that I was in school. I was capable of learning. I was capable of doing something. After dropping out of high school, that's the worst feeling ever- to fail. When you accomplish it, that's the biggest thing," she says. With encouragement from several mentors (including former NICC Instructor, Margaret Maas), Gwen turned her interest to Human Services/Counseling.

Hands-on foster care experience, research, and community observations were factors for this direction. "At one point, there was only one Native foster home in Woodbury county," she says. Recognizing this inequity, Gwen was able to collaborate with universities, tribes, Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA), Morningstar Counseling, as well as many others to focus on foster parent training, providing an emphasis on trauma, history, culture, Native-American perspective, and addressing distrust of the system itself. Native American Foster Homes for Native Children (NF4NC) has been a big focus of her work. While there are a lot of strides being made to provide foster families with new knowledge, increased interest, and other resources, Gwen isn't ready to let up and has her eyes set on the bigger picture.

She currently serves on The Umonhon Tribal Council as the Secretary (also from 2012-2015), as well as a Clinical Social Worker at Carl T. Curtis focusing on connecting dialysis patients and their families with resources and navigating the healthcare system. Gwen also has a variety of experiences ranging from Board Member at NICC to Social Worker for the Omaha Tribe to ICWA Specialist and Winnebago Tribe CFS Program Manager. These varying experiences have brought a larger perspective and connection among these areas and in extension human services/counseling. Gwen says, "Part of my goal is to recruit, train, teach and supervise future social workers. We have at least 90% of our jobs are human services and providing services to people." She discusses the importance of sustainable organization and leadership, increase in indigenous professionals, safe, healthy and happy families, as well as the importance of coordinating within the community, highlighting collaborations with NICC, local providers, and larger networks to reach a common goal.

She is always quick to tie back to where her passion for education began- NICC. Grateful for her mentors, experiences, and the journey that resulted, she says, "Education- that's the key, that's the ticket to doing better, knowing better, wanting better, not just for ourselves but for others... Our tribal community colleges, [they're] here for us. There's no other place like this."

General Liberal Arts







General Science Studies



MELVA LYONS BELTRAN


General Liberal Arts
